

HISTORICAL NOTICE.

N the 23rd December, 1878, a Royal Commission was appointed to inquire into and report upon the operations of the University of New Zealand and its relations to the Secondary Schools of the Colony, and upon the best means of bringing secondary and superior education within the reach of the youth of both sexes. The Commission in its report, under date 9th July, 1879, among other things recommended that the inequality in the educational institutions of the two islands should be removed by establishing, at the most important centres of population in the North Island, Colleges capable of supplying an education of the same standard as that provided by the University of Otago and Canterbury College, and proposed that the Government should invite the Legislature make immediate provision for the establishment of two Colleges, one at Auckland and the other at Wellington, of such a character as has been indicated. The Commissioners further stated that "They were of opinion that it will be necessary for the Government, either to select out of lands at its disposal suitable sites for College buildings at Auckland and Wellington, or to acquire such sites, and that two grants of £12,500 each should be made for the building of the two Colleges and for fittings and apparatus," and went on to say, "Although these sums are not equal to those expended for like purposes in Dunedin and Christchurch, we think they will be found sufficient for present requirements."

For the annual maintenance of these two Colleges the Commissioners suggested that the Government should utilise the reserves set apart

for the promotion of higher education in the Provincial Districts of Auckland and Wellington, and as the present endowments may be presumed to be inadequate, the two Colleges should be respectively endowed with Crown lands sufficient to provide an immediate income to each amounting to £4,000 per annum; and if that is not practicable, the deficit in each case, until such income is realised, be made good by a pecuniary grant.

A College was established in Auckland by "The Auckland University College Act, 1882."

Nothing was done for Wellington until the year 1894, when an Act was passed entitled "The Middle District of New Zealand University College Act, 1894," which said, "There shall be established in the city of Wellington a College to be connected with the University of New Zealand," and provision was made for a governing body, to be called the Council, but no provision was made for any pecuniary grant or endowment, and though certain members of the Council were appointed,

nothing could be done for want of funds.

In the year 1897 the Right Hon, R. J. Seddon, P.C., Premier of the Colony, introduced into Parliament the Victoria College Act; an Act, as stated in the preamble, "to promote Higher Education by the establishment of a College at Wellington in commemoration of the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," the College being intended to embrace in its work the Provincial Districts of Wellington, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough and Westland. The Act was passed on the 22nd December, 1897, the Council was formed, and the work of organisation was begun. The Act provides for the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of a grant of £4,000 a year, and out of this sum the Council was required to give six Scholarships each year called "Queen's Scholarships," to persons of either sex under the age of 14 years upon the results of an examination under such conditions as the Council may prescribe. In 1903 an amending Act was passed providing for six Junior and four Senior Queen's Scholarships. In 1906 the College was relieved of the payment of these Scholarships. Since 1905 the College has received from Parliament an annual grant of £2,000 for specialisation in Law and Science. The Act of 1897 further sets apart a parcel of land 4,000 acres in extent in the Nukumaru Survey District (Wellington Provincial District) as an endowment for the College.

The Council decided to begin by the appointment of four Professors for the Chairs of English Language and Literature, Classics, Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, and Chemistry, and the following were appointed:—Classics, J. Brown, M.A., St. Andrews and Oxford; English Language and Literature, H. Mackenzie, M.A. St. Andrews; Chemistry and Physics, T. H. Easterfield, M.A. Cambridge, Ph.D. Wurzburg; Mathematics, R. C. Maclaurin, M.A., LL.D. Cambridge. These Professors arrived in the Colony at the end of March, 1899, and as soon as possible classes were organised and lectures begun. Having no College buildings the Council arranged for the use of rooms in the Girls' High School and in the Technical School Buildings belonging to the Education Board. In addition to the four Professors first appointed, G. W. von Zedlitz, M.A., Oxford, was appointed Professor of Modern Languages in December, 1901, H. B. Kirk, M.A., N.Z. was appointed Professor of Biology in March, 1903, and J. W. Salmond, M.A., N.Z., LL.B., London, Fellow of University College, London, was appointed Professor of Law in December, 1905, and M. W. Richmond, B.Sc., London, LL.B., N.Z., was appointed Professor of English and New Zealand Law in 1906. Provision was made for the teaching of Mental Science, Economics, and Education by lecturers. T. A. Hunter, M.A., M.Sc., was appointed Professor of Mental Science and Economics in November, 1907. W. Gray, M.A., B.Sc., Principal of the Training College, Wellington, was appointed Lecturer on Education in 1905. The College was by the Senate of the New Zealand University admitted as an institution affiliated to the University of New Zealand on the 23rd February, 1899.

In 1900 an Act was passed whereby the College Council was empowered to acquire a site for the College buildings, being part of a town reserve situated on Salamanca Road, containing six acres, and the Government has provided £31,000 towards the cost of buildings. A portion of the buildings has been erected, the foundation stone having been laid by His Excellency Lord Plunket, K.C.V.O., on the 27th August, 1904.

REGULATIONS.

TERMS.

There shall be two Terms in each year. First Term shall begin on the last Tuesday in March, and end on the last day in June. Second Term shall begin three clear weeks from the first day of July, and shall end in the last week of October.

KEEPING OF TERMS

Students shall be considered to have kept a year's terms who shall have attended three-fourths of the Lectures in the subjects which they select, and passed the annual examination in those subjects. Terms may be kept in the following subjects:-

All Students are expected to do the regular work of the classes which they attend, and to sit for the annual College examination unless leave of absence has been obtained from the Professor.

^{*} For the purposes of the Degree of Bachelor of Laws, Jurisprudence and Constitutional History shall be deemed to be two subjects, but no student can keep First Year Terms in those two alone.

Students other than exempted students desiring to take English History as a Subject for Terms must obtain the sanction of the Professorial Board.

REGULATIONS AS TO SUBJECTS.

- (a) First year students may keep Terms by passing in two subjects.
- (b) In the second year students must pass in three subjects in order to keep Terms.
- (c) Students keeping third year Terms must pass in three subjects unless they have passed in four subjects either in the College Examination at the end of their second year or in the first section of the University Examination. No student shall keep Third Years Terms in any subject in which he has kept Second Years Terms or passed in the first section of the University Examination, except in those subjects in which two distinct courses are recognised. A subject repeated in accordance with the New Zealand University Statute B.A. Degree counts as a fresh subject.
- (d) Graduates in Arts proceeding to a Degree in Science, or Bachelors of Science proceeding to a Degree in Arts, must keep terms by attending lectures (unless exempted) and passing the College Examination in those subjects in which they are to be examined by the University for their new Degree.
- (e) All students must send to the Registrar, on or before the fifteenth day of August, notice of the subjects in which they wish to be examined. Students repeating a subject under Regulation (c) must notify the same.
- (f) These rules shall apply equally to exempted students, and in all cases the examination for exempted students shall be the same as that for those not exempted. Students availing themselves of the

exemption clause in any subject are exempted students, and must pay exempted students' fees for all subjects in which they are examined.

(g) The fee for the Annual Examination of any student exempted from attendance at lectures shall be three guineas, if he is examined at any other place than Wellington; or half-a-guinea for each subject if examined in Wellington.

N.B.—Certificates will be issued by the Registrar to students who have kept terms in the College Annual Examination.

FEES FOR LECTURES.

Fees may be paid to the Registrar in two instalments, half each Term. All fees are to be paid within fourteen days of the beginning of each term, and an additional charge or fine of 2/6 is to be imposed for each class fee remaining unpaid after this time. Students who have not paid their fees within one month of the commencement of term shall be debarred from further attendance at classes until their fees are paid or some satisfactory explanation of the non-payment is given. Students who begin to attend Lectures at a period subsequent to the date above mentioned, must pay the full fees when they begin to attend. Fees for Lectures are as follows:—

SUGGESTIONS TO STUDENTS

(a) Intending students are advised to map out their course as far as possible at the beginning of their College career so as to avoid clashing in their classes.

(b) Students who are taking an Arts Degree are recommended to take during their first two years such subjects as they have already studied at school, and to reserve for the second part of their

course the more philosophical subjects.

(c) The Professorial Board wishes to discourage the idea that any student is likely to pass his Degree Examination in any subject in Arts or Science on one year's work, unless he has had some previous acquaintance with the subject in question.

(d) The Chairman of the Professorial Board or any Professor will be glad to advise students with regard to their work.

SIR GEORGE GREY SCHOLARSHIP.

A Scholarship shall be awarded subject to the granting of a vote by Parliament.

REGULATIONS.

- 1. The Scholarship shall be open to undergraduates whose academic standing does not exceed three years.
- 2. The subjects of examination shall be chosen from the following:—
 - (a) HEAT. SOUND AND LIGHT.
 - (b) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.
 - (c) ASTRONOMY.
 - (d) GEOLOGY.
 - (e) PURE MATHEMATICS.
 - (f) MECHANICS AND HYDROSTATICS.
 - (g) CHEMISTRY.
 - (h) BOTANY.
 - (i) ZOOLOGY.

Of these a candidate may choose any three, which must include one at least of the subjects a, b, c, d.

- 3. The Scholarship will be awarded on the result of the College Annual Examination, with a special practical examination in Natural Science, Chemistry, and Physics, and a special paper in Astronomy.
- 4. Out of the nine possible subjects at least two must be taken and not more than three. In awarding the Scholarship the Professorial Board will prefer special distinction in a single subject to a fair knowledge of the two or three subjects selected.
- 5. The award of the Scholarship will be announced soon after the College Annual Examination.
- 6. The Scholarship will not be tenable with any other Scholarship or Exhibition.

- 7. The Scholar must attend such a course of lectures and do such practical work as shall be approved by the Professorial Board.
- 8. The Scholar must not during the tenure of his Scholarship undertake any duties that in the opinion of the Professorial Board will prevent him from prosecuting his studies satisfactorily.

The Scholarship is of the value of £50, tenable

for one year.

JACOB JOSEPH SCHOLARSHIPS.

By a munificent bequest of the late Mr Jacob Joseph, two Scholarships have been founded, to be called the "Jacob Joseph Scholarships," each of the value of £60.

REGULATIONS.

- 1. The two Scholarships will be awarded annually among students qualified under paragraph (c) hereof on the results of the Honours Examination of the New Zealand University in either Law, Science, or Arts; ceteris paribus, preference shall be given to Law and Science (including Mental Science), provided that the candidate proves to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board that he or she has done substantial laboratory work. (For the purposes of this condition, Mathematics and Political Science shall be regarded as Arts subjects.)
- 2. No Scholarship shall be awarded to a candidate who fails to get Second Class Honours at least or their equivalent conferred on him or her by the New Zealand University.

Provided also-

(a) No one shall be entitled to the Scholarship unless he has obtained Honours, in the case of an Arts or Science student,

- within five years of his matriculation; and in the case of a Law Student, within seven years of his matriculation.
- (b) The holding of any other Scholarship shall not debar any successful candidate from holding a Jacob Joseph Scholarship.
- (c) Every applicant shall fulfill the following conditions:—
 - 1. His name shall be on the Books of Victoria College at the time he takes his pass Degree.
 - 2. He shall pursue his studies at Victoria College to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board during the year in which he sits for his Honours or the equivalent examination.
 - 3. He shall during the year in which he holds the Scholarship do at Victoria College substantial and original work in the subjects in which he gained Honours or in some cognate subject to the satisfaction of the Professorial Board.
 - 4. Such work shall be evidenced by thesis or dissertation accompanied by a synopsis of the bibliography of the topic of the thesis or dissertation. Such thesis or dissertation shall be handed to the Chairman of the Professorial Board for perusal and preservation in the records of the College Library.
- 3. The amount of the Scholarship shall be paid in two equal portions. The first shall be paid on the 1st August and the last after the receipt of the

thesis or dissertation by the Chairman of the Professorial Board. Neither portion shall be paid until the Council has been assured by the Professorial Board that the Scholarship winner has continued to do substantial and original work in the subject in which he gained Honours, or in some cognate subject. The last portion shall not be paid until the Council has also been assured by the Professorial Board that the said thesis or dissertation is of some value as a contribution to the knowledge of the subject on which it treats.

4. Words importing the masculine gender include females.

RHODES SCHOLARSHIP.

The Professorial Board of the Victoria College has power to nominate one candidate annually for the Rhodes Scholarship.

Notice of intended elections will be given from time to time.

Candidates must apply for nomination to the Professorial Board not later than the 27th October.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

(Professor Mackenzie.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

This class meets three hours a week—Tuesdays 5 to 7 p.m., and Thursdays 6 to 7 p.m. Lectures will be delivered on Anglo-Saxon, Middle English, Historical English Grammar, and English Composition. A general knowledge of the history of the Literature of the Reign of Queen Anne, or, as an alternative, the "set books" for the Senior English Class (for the year) form part of the work for First Year's Terms. Students can attend any of the Senior Class Lectures dealing with the "Period" or "Set Books."

SENIOR CLASS.

This Class meets three hours a week—Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays 8 to 9 p.m.

Two lectures will be delivered every week on the Literature of the Period (Reign of Queen Anne) and one on the set books. For Terms (Second or Third Year's) students will be examined on the work prescribed for the B.A. and LL.B., which comprises all the ground covered in the Junior and Senior Classes.

Training College students can keep First Year's Terms on the work prescribed for the Senior Class (or for the "C" certificate).

Students taking English as a one-year's course are required to take Junior and Senior English together.

INTERMEDIATE ENGLISH.

A series of more advanced lectures on Early and Middle English and on the literature of the period will be delivered to students, who are familiar with the work of the Junior and Senior Classes, and who are working for a Scholarship or are taking English as a "repeated" subject in their Degree course. Unless this class can be taken with the Honours Class the hours of meeting will be arranged, as far as possible, to meet the convenience of students.

HONOURS CLASS.

Period of Literature: -1688 to 1744.

Set Books:-

Lamb's Essays of Elia.

Goldsmith's Vicar of Wakefield and Citizen of the World

Shakespeare's King John; King Richard II.; King Henry IV., Parts I. and II.; King Henry V., and King Richard III.

Sweet's Anglo-Saxon Reader (8/6), Morris and Skeats' Specimens, Vol. I. (9/-) are also prescribed. Pages 175 to 201 of the Anglo-Saxon Reader (7th Edition) are to be omitted.

The lectures will cover the ground prescribed for Honours. The Class will meet on Mondays. Wednesdays, and Fridays, from 6 to 8 p.m., or at such other hours as may suit the convenience of students.

Beowulf and the Christ of Cynewulf (Ginn & Co.) will be used for practice in "unprescribed" Anglo-Saxon.

The following books (in addition to those prescribed for Senior English) are recommended:—

EDUCATION.—(William Gray, M.A., B.Sc.)

The class will meet on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, from 4 p.m. till 5 p.m.

The work will be mainly along the lines prescribed for the B.A. Degree.

Text Books.—Physical Nature of the Child (Rowe) 4/6; Talks on Psychology (James) 4/6; Talks on Pedagogics (Parker) 7/6; Educational Reformers (Quick) 6/-; Elements of General Method (McMurray) 4/6.

MENTAL SCIENCE.

(Professor Hunter.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

The object of this Class is to make students familiar with the outlines of the subject. All beginners are recommended to commence with this Class. The Class meets on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 6 p.m. Weekly exercises are done and time given to the discussion of questions.

Students are required to attend the practical course in Experimental Psychology.

Text Books: Mellone's Logic; Thilly's Ethics; Titchener's Psychology.

Any students desirous of reading for Honours in Mental Science should confer with the Professor before beginning their University course.

SENIOR CLASS.

The work of this Class covers, but is not confined to, the requirements of B.A. and B.Sc. degrees. The Class meets on Tuesday at 6 p.m., on Wednesday and Frday, at 7 p.m. Weekly exercises are done, and time given to the discussion of questions and to practical work in Experimental Psychology.

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Text Books:—Hibben's Logic, Stout's Psychology, Mackenzie's Ethics.

Exempted students are invited to communicate with the Professor with reference to the lines upon which they should read.

ADVANCED CLASS.

The arrangement of work in this Class is designed to meet the requirements of those who are reading for Senior Scholarships or are repeating Mental Science.

The Class meets three times a week.

Text Books: Welton's Logic (2 vols.), Bosanquet's Essentials of Logic; Hoffding's Psychology; Sidgwich's History of Ethics; Aristotle's Ethics Plato's Republic; Mayor's Ancient Philosophy.

HONOURS CLASS.

This Class is for students reading for Honours. The Class meets at hours to be fixed at the beginning of the session.

Text Books: Venn's Empirical Logic; Paulsen's Ethics; Wundt's Outlines of Psychology; Stout's Analytic Psychology; Weber's History of Philosophy; Windelband's History of Philosophy.

Other reading will be prescribed as required.

ECONOMICS.—(Professor Hunter.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

This class is designed as an introduction to the subject and covers the work prescribed for B.A. degree. The class meets three times a week. Weekly exercises are done and time given to the discussion of questions.

Text Books:-

Nicholson's Elements of Political Economy Marshall's Economics of Industry Bastable's International Trade. Hobson's Evolution of Modern Capitalism. Exempted students are invited to communicate with the Professor with reference to their reading.

Any students desirous of reading for Honours in Political Science should confer with the Professor at the beginning of their University course.

SENIOR CLASS.

This class meets the requirements of those who are reading for Senior Scholarship or are repeating Economics. The class meets at hours to be arranged at beginning of the session.

Text Books :-

Marshall's Principles Keyne's Scope and Method Plehn's Public Finance

Other reading is prescribed as required.

HONOURS CLASS.

This class meets the requirements of students reading for Honours. The class meets at hours to be fixed at the beginning of the session.

Text Books:-

Nicholson's Principles and other works (prescribed as required).

LATIN.—(Professor Rankine Brown). ADVANCED CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 5 to 6 p.m. The work in the class is conditioned mainly by the books set for the University Honours Examination, but is not confined to these. The work on Tuesday and Thursday is mainly sight translation, and students Repeating Latin must attend these classes. The Books read at these hours in 1908 will be Tacitus Annals I., Cicero Selected Letters (Pritchard and Barnard), Lucretius I.—III. (selected passages). Terence, Phormio; and

students Repeating Latin will be expected to show some knowledge of these books in the examination for Terms. The special books for Honours are read on Mondays and Fridays. If circumstances permit an extra hour will be given on Saturdays. Courses of Lectures are given in successive years on Literature, History and Philology; and weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose (Ramsay, Vol. II., 4s. 6d.).

SENIOR CLASS.

This Class prepares for the B.A. Examination of the University of New Zealand, and meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, 6 to 7 p.m. During 1908 the books read will be Tacitus Annals I., Virgil Georgics IV. Weekly exercises are set in Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. ii., 4/6) and Grammar (Liddell's Grammar Papers), and lectures are delivered at intervals. A voluntary class is held on Saturdays, 8.45 to 9.45 a.m., for Sight Translation. All students are expected to attend at this hour, but those who cannot do so will be excused on application to the Profesor. Dies Romani (Arnold) will be used.

JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays 7 to 8 p.m. It is intended for first year students, and the work is of a more elementary nature than that of the Senior Class. Special attention is paid to Latin Prose (Ramsay, vol. i., 4/6), and Grammar. The books read during 1908 will be Livy Book I. (Brown), and Virgil Georgies IV. All students are expected to take this Class, unless exempted for special reasons by the Professor. Members of the Junior Class are advised to attend the sight translation class on Saturdays—8.45 to 9.45 a.m.

Exempted students keeping first year's terms will be examined on the work of the Junior Class, but they may if they prefer it substitute Tacitus for

Livy.

GREEK.—(Professor Rankine Brown.)

ADVANCED CLASS.

A class meeting four or five hours per week will be formed as required for students reading for Honours or repeating Greek. It cannot be held after 5 o'clock.

SENIOR CLASS.

The work of this Class is arranged to suit students who are reading for the B.A. Examination. It will meet at least three hours per week at such times as may best suit students, providing that they can come before 5 p.m. The books prescribed for 1908 are Plato Apology, Crito, Homer's Iliad XXII. For Greek Prose, Arnold (3/6) and Sidgwick (5/-) will be used. Goodwin's Greek Grammar (6/-) is recommended.

JUNIOR CLASS.

This Class is intended for students who have just begun or are beginning Greek. It will meet probably three hours per week before 5 p.m., at an hour to suit students. The following books will be used:—Smith's Initia Graeca, part i. (3/6) Arnold's Greek Prose (3/6); Greek War of Independence (Sonnenschein).

FRENCH.—(Professor von Zedlitz.)

There will be four classes in this subject:

- 1. Junior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 2. Senior Class for B.A. degree work.
- 3. Senior Scholarship class.
- 4. Honours Class.

In addition to these, weekly lectures will be given on French pronunciation.

1. JUNIOR CLASS.

This class is intended principally for first-year students. The work will constitute the first half of a two years' course in preparation for the B.A. examination. The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 7 p.m. and on Saturdays from 11 to 12 a.m.

The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. examination of 1908. Regular exercises will be

done in French Prose (Rey's French Composition and Idioms) and in Grammar (Spiers' Rapid French Exercises; Wellington College French Grammar).

Sudents in this class will be entitled to attend lectures of the Senior Class, and to count such attendance towards keeping terms.

2. SENIOR CLASS.

This class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 to 8 p.m., and on Saturdays from 10 to 11 a.m. The books read will be those prescribed for the B.A. examination 1908. Regular exercises will be done in French Composition, Grammar, and Unseen Translation. The class will use E. le Francoi's French Test Papers. Lectures will be given on Literature as prescribed for the B.A. examination.

3. SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CLASS.

The work of this class will be in part the same as that of the Senior class, but special lectures will be delivered forming the first half of a two years' honours course. The times for these lectures will be arranged to suit the convenience of students; provisionally 4 to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays has been reserved for them.

4. Honours Class.

This class will probably meet from 4 to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Intending students are requested to communicate with Professor von Zedlitz without delay. The Dictionary recommended is the Dictionnaire General of Hatzfeld Darmesteter and Thomas (32/-).

5. Pronunciation Class.

Lectures on Pronunciation and the Teaching of Pronunciation will be delivered on Tuesdays from 8 to 9 p.m. and a class for viva voce practice will be

The times for these lectures will be arranged to suit the convenience of students; provisionally 2.30 to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays has been reserved for them.

4. Honours Class.

This class will probably meet from 2.30 to 4 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Intending students are requested to communicate with Professor von Zedlitz without delay. The Dictionary recommended is Muret-Sanders smaller dictionary (18/-).

5. Elementary Class.

The times for this class will be arranged to suit the convenience of students. Siepmann's Public School Primer will be used.

In connection with the requirements of the University an oral examination will be held at the various centres about the middle of October. Candidates are advised to take this examination when sitting for First Year's Terms. The examination will include dictation, and reading of a short passage taken from the Fourth Act of Maria Stuart.

ITALIAN AND SPANISH.—(Professor von Zedlitz.)

Classes in Italian and Spanish will be formed if desired, but it is not probable that time can be found for these subjects after noon. The work done will depend on the requirements of students; elementary work is not excluded.

MATHEMATICS.—(Professor Picken).

LAW.

(Professor of Law and Dean of the Faculty of Law— Professor Adamson. Professor of English and New Zealand Law—Professor Richmond.)

Courses of lectures are given during each session on all subjects required for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, and for the Professional Examinations in Law. Courses of lectures in the subjects of the course for the degree of Master of Laws are given when required.

1. Jurisprudence and Constitutional History. (Professor Adamson.)

These constitute two subjects in the course for the degree of Bachelor of Laws and a single subject for the degree of Bachelor of Arts. A course of three lectures a week will be delivered throughout the session, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 5 p.m. Candidates for a degree in Arts or Law are advised to attend this class during two sessions.

2. Roman Law.—(Professor Adamson.)

A course of three lectures a week during the first term, and of two lectures a week during the second term will be delivered on these subjects.

CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS.—Professor Easterfield).

I.—GENERAL COURSE.

This course consists of three lectures weekly throughout the session, and serves as a general introduction to the study of chemistry; it also meets the requirements of candidates for the pass Degrees of the University of New Zealand.

Part I. treats of the non-metallic elements and their important compounds, the laws of chemical combination and elementary chemical theory.

Part II. deals with the metals, their occurrence and the methods of extraction from their ores, their

detection and quantitative estimation.

Part III. is devoted to organic chemistry, and includes organic analysis, general methods of purification, identification and relationships of typical organic compounds.

Intending students should consult Professor

2.—Organic Chemistry (Elementary).

The class meets twice weekly, at hours to be arranged. A knowledge of general inorganic chemistry will be pre-supposed. The course will be fully illustrated experimentally, and will meet the

requirements of medical students, and of those who propose to take the advanced course in a subsequent year.

3.—ADVANCED COURSE.

During the session 1908 Organic and Physical Chemistry will mainly be studied in this course.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

The Victoria College laboratories afford unusual facilities for the study of experimental chemistry. To each student a separate bench is allotted, furnished with gas, water, and reagents. A charge of ten shillings is made for materials, but unusual breakages must be made good. Special encouragement is given to those who, having obtained a sound training in practical chemistry, propose to carry out original investigations in organic, physical, or technological chemistry.

- Students who wish to take up chemistry as a profession are advised to work in the laboratory not less than eighteen hours weekly, and to attend the lectures in physics, mathematics, and German.

All students are required to keep a systematic record of their laboratory work.

1.—Preliminary Course.

This course meets the requirements of students preparing for the pass Degrees of the University. The Class meets twice weekly for purposes of demonstration, but the laboratory will be open at other specified times to suit the convenience of students. A minimum attendance of five hours weekly is required from Degree candidates.

Subjects treated.—Simple inorganic preparations, elementary quantitative measurement, qualitative analysis.

2 ADVANCED COURSE.

This is intended for those who wish to obtain a useful knowledge of practical chemistry, such as is required by Honours students, professional chemists, or teachers of the subject. Demonstrations will be arranged at hours to suit the students, and special attention will be paid to quantitative analysis, determination of physico-chemical constants, the preparation and systematic examination of organic and inorganic compounds. The full course will extend over three years.

Physics Lectures. General Course.

A Class will meet twice weekly for lectures, and once for physical calculations. The fundamental principles of mechanics, heat, light, sound, electricity and magnetism will be discussed and illustrated from the experimental standpoint, with the object of

directing and assisting students in their reading; during the present session the chief attention will be paid to Electricity and Magnetism.

A more advanced class will be held provided that a sufficient number of students present them-

selves.

1. PRELIMINARY COURSE.

This course meets the requirements of candidates for the Medical Intermediate and Senior Civil Service Examinations. The class meets on Mondays and Fridays at 6 o'clock.

During the present session Heat, Light, and Sound will form the chief subjects of study.

PHYSICAL LABORATORY.

The object of the laboratory course is to familiarise students with the accurate measurement of physical quantities, and with the construction and manipulation of apparatus. A minimum attendance of four hours weekly is expected from candidates for pass Degrees. The hours will be arranged to suit the convenience of the students.

BIOLOGY.—(Professor Kirk). GENERAL BIOLOGY.

To be taken by all students whether they choose Botany or Zoology.

Note.—Students are advised not to take Biology, whether they choose Botany or Zoology, as a one year's subject. If any students find it necessary

to do so, they should communicate with the Professor at the beginning of their course.

One lecture a week during first year; two during second; laboratory work during both years.

Lectures :-

The consideration of typical organisms, both animals and plants, selected with regard to the lists prescribed in the University statutes, but not confined to those lists; the general principles of biology as illustrated by these and other types; classification, etc.

The second year's course will consist of lectures on the general questions of Biology, as evolution, distribution, heredity, etc., and on Physiology and the anatomy of the Frog. Although the Frog will be the subject of most of the practical work, the lectures will be so framed as to aim at establishing a working knowledge of the elementary physiology of the higher animals; and this course can, if necesary, be taken by students who wish to gain such a knowledge, although they may not have taken the first year's course. Students wishing to take the subject at the degree examinations must take both courses, and should spend two years in doing so.

Practical Work:-

Microscopical manipulation, the use of dissecting instruments, method; the dissection of typical organisms and the study of their life history.

Two Years Course Botany.

Two lectures a week during first year; one during second; laboratory work during both years.

The structure, life history, physiology, etc., of the prescribed types and others, consideration of the groups to which the types belong, especial attention being given to the prescribed natural orders; classification, etc.

In the first year the work will deal mainly with the types, with classification and with morphology; in the second with physiology, and with the prescribed orders.
